

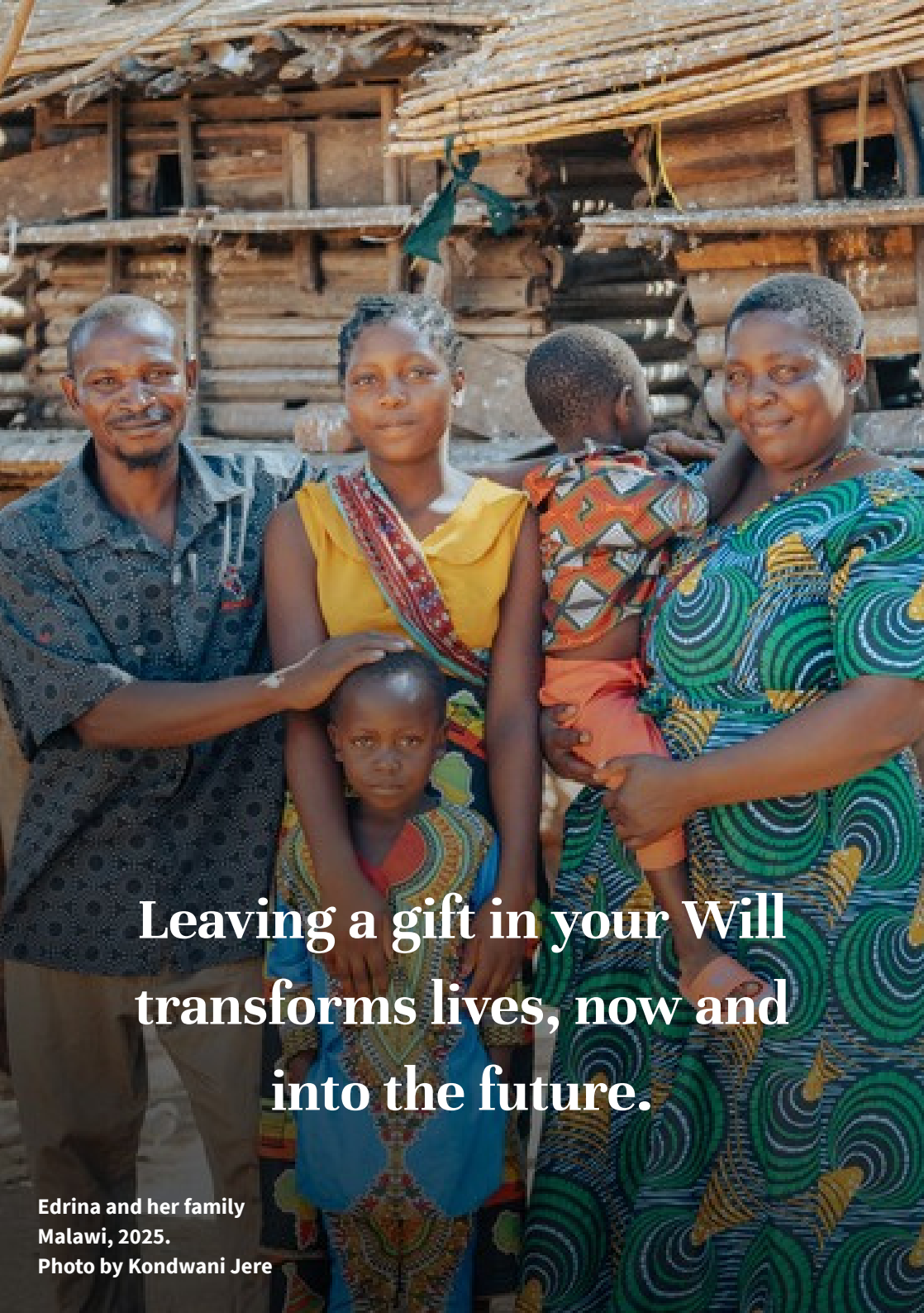

commitment



Miles and Deborah Protter have been part of The Hunger Project for almost 40 years - 35 of them as a married couple committed to the same cause.

"We believe investing in The Hunger Project is incredibly worthwhile because it's community-led," says Miles.

They're committed to empowering women, especially by the entire community, to take charge of the end of their own hunger."

For Deborah, the turning point came from meeting the women themselves.

"I went to the countries and met women who couldn't even read and write, who eventually were leading communities. That's when I understood - women are the key to ending hunger."

The Hunger Project has shaped their family for a generation; their daughter has been involved since she was 13.

"It's an expression of our values," Deborah says. "When we decided to include The Hunger Project in our Will, I felt like our children and grandchildren are going to be provided for, but so are the people who don't have what they have."

"It's about leaving a legacy that makes a difference way beyond our lifetime," Miles adds.

"You can't take it with you. But it's great to know this is going to keep making a difference the way we think is important."

Veronica, aged 72 from Ghana, has witnessed the progress in her village since her community partnered with The Hunger Project.

"We now have a bank, a health clinic, and recently, we even got internet access. In the past, making ends meet was sometimes a challenge for me. However, through agricultural training, the yield from my land has increased."

Veronica and her husband, Simon, currently live in a relatively small house. However, they are constructing a new and larger one.

"This is possible because I now earn more and save more. Financial management training has certainly helped with that."

"Our new house will have more space for our children and grandchildren, allowing them to move in with us. That would be nice for me and my husband as we are getting older."

How to leave a gift in your Will

1 **Have a conversation**

When creating or updating your Will, speaking with your loved ones about your wishes will ensure they know how important your gift is to you, and they're provided for.

2 **Decide the type of gift**

We strongly suggest you seek professional advice to determine the right approach for you and your loved ones. Common approaches include:

- A residual bequest is the residue (or remainder) of your estate once specific gifts and expenses have been taken care of
- A specified dollar amount, noting that the impact will change over time due to inflation
- An asset for example: real estate, shares or bonds.

3 **Create or update your will**

Having a legally valid and up-to-date Will ensures that your wishes for your legacy are carried out.

Wording for your Will

Making or changing your Will to include a gift to The Hunger Project Australia could be as simple as contacting your legal advisor, or you can create a free Will online. Here is a link to visit the EveryWill website if you choose to:



It's important that your bequest gift is worded correctly, and the following is recommended as a guide.

"I give to The Hunger Project Australia, ABN 45 002 569 271:

- The residue of my estate (or __% of the residue of my estate) or
- The whole of my estate (or __% of my estate)
- The sum of \$____
- Asset or assets

for which the receipt of the Treasurer or other authorised officer shall be an absolute discharge."

How we acknowledge your gift

We'd love to know if you've chosen to leave a gift to The Hunger Project in your Will. It helps us to plan for the future, and to thank you in a way that you prefer.

If you choose to let us know of your plans, you have the option of being recognised for your incredible gift within your lifetime.

You'll also have the option of becoming part of the Legacy Circle, a like-minded group of people committed to creating a better world - one without hunger.

Frequently asked questions

What is the best way to leave a gift?

This is entirely your decision, and we are grateful for whichever way you chose to leave a gift to us. However, an untied bequest gives us the greatest flexibility to seize opportunities and make an impact.

How will my gift be used?

Your gift will be directed towards helping more than 12 million people around the world lift themselves out of hunger and poverty, supporting programs from maternal health, nutrition, climate change adaptation, water, education and empowerment.

My gift is modest – will it count?

Absolutely – any size gift, even just 1%, can make an incredible impact towards creating a world without hunger.

Is my gift tax deductible?

Gifts in Wills are generally not tax deductible. However, certain types of capital gains tax assets, like shares or property, may be distributed tax effectively due to our deductible gift recipient (DGR) status. Please seek professional advice for your specific circumstances.
